Experience and Expertise of the organization in the project's subject area

We have been implementing several bilingual programmes since 2006, both in French and English as foreign languages.

During all these years, we have designed our own CLIL approach to respond to our context, which has resulted in a combination of hard CLIL and soft CLIL practices and an ever increasing rate (currently at 40%) of our students joining the English and French CLIL-based Programme.

We have published a glossary of English and French expressions that any learner will find useful when trying to respond to the linguistic demands of conveying essential content belonging to subjects such as Biology, Physics or History. (ISBN 978-84-09-00414-0).

We too have a remarkable experience in project based learning. Some of these projects include creating posters, videos, comics and performing songs and plays. Our flagship project involves rehearsing an abridged version of a Shakespeare play with two groups of 12 year olds over a period of seven months and performing it both at a local theatre and in London before an English-speaking audience.

We have been given two good practices awards in bilingual education (Department of Education of Cantabria, 2014 and IV International Conference on Bilingual Education, University of Cordoba, 2018).

Recently, a series of two TVE (Spanish television) documentaries have featured a number of parents, students and teachers of our school recounting their experience and views on bilingual education.

He is the founder of MSC (IES Marqués de Santillana Shakespeare Company) and has directed six school productions of *A midsummer night's dream* and *Romeo and Juliet*.

Currently, he is the Head of the English Department and leads an enthusiastic team of Modern Languages bringing together 19 experienced teachers of English, French, Biology, Physics, Music, Physical Education, Technology and History. They all attend in service CLIL training sessions every month. While some are more familiar with CLIL principles than others, all of them share a joy for teaching and developing their professional skills.
